Ice Cube is one of the most influential figures in the history of rap and hip-hop. Best known for the vitriol of his angry black man recordings of the late 1980s and mid 1990s, Ice Cube epitomizes the genre often referred to as gangsta rap. Much of his music from these years is focused on the disturbing realities of life in black urban ghettos, and as a result it chronicles such complex and controversial issues as racial stereotypes, street gangs, racial profiling, black

The fourth chapter considers Ice Cube's career in film, beginning with a discussion of his performance in *Boyz n the Hood* and ending with a look at his most recent films, *Barber Shop*, *Barber Shop II*, *Are We There Yet?* and *Are We Done Yet?* The fifth and final chapter looks back over all of Ice

Cube's work to date and considers his impact and his legacy in music and popular culture at large. .
